Changing Coasts is a crowdsourcing project on the Pembrokeshire Coast aimed at capturing changes to our coastline and highlighting the topical issue of Climate Change. It's based on the principles of keeping it simple, low cost and accessible. Our coastline is dynamic. At times it changes slowly, and at times the changes happen more quickly. Some of these changes are due to the forces of mother nature, others are brought about by human interaction with the landscape. It's important that we capture these changes, both to raise awareness of the issue of climate change, and to inform our work in the future.



The technology available to capture change is advancing rapidly. But is it necessary to use the latest technology, often at great cost, and for it to sometimes be obsolete within a short space of time? Unfortunately, including an element of high tech digital innovation in a project is often seen as desirable by funders – sometimes this results in the media driving the project at the expense of the messages and opportunities for engagement.
